Attorney General of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation

Mr. Dellinger is an enrolled member of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. After graduating from Baker University with a Bachelor's of Science in Accounting, he received his Juris Doctorate from Oklahoma City University School of Law. He was an Assistant Attorney General for the Muscogee (Creek) Nation from May 1996 until February 2008. In February 2008, he was appointed and confirmed as the first Secretary of the Nation of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. In January 2012, he returned to the Office of the Attorney General as the First Assistant Attorney General. In January of 2016, he was appointed and confirmed as the Attorney General of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation.

Secretary of Natural Resources for the Cherokee Nation

Secretary Hill was appointed as Secretary of Natural Resources for the Cherokee Nation in 2015 after many years of service to the Nation in the Office of the Attorney General. Since 2004, Secretary Hill has represented the Cherokee Nation in tribal, state and federal courts. Her legal career predominantly focuses on Environmental and Natural Resources issues for the tribe.

Secretary Hill serves on several Working Groups advising the Department of Energy, the Environmental Protection Agency, and the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

Senior Counsel to the Chickasaw Nation

Mr. Greetham serves as Senior Counsel to the Chickasaw Nation. Mr. Greetham was previously a partner in the Albuquerque office of the Nordhaus Law Firm, where he specialized in the representation of Tribal governments, and he has worked in-house with the Chickasaw Nation for 12 years. He taught Federal Indian Law courses at the University of New Mexico School of Law and Oklahoma University College of Law and will be teaching Water Law in the fall of 2019 at the Oklahoma City University School of Law.
